

Privacy Notice for Parents / Carers

Under data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'Privacy Notices' sometimes called 'Fair Processing Notices'

This Privacy Notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about **pupils**.

We, Parkwood Primary School, Deanwood Drive, Rainham, Gillingham, Kent ME8 9LP are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law.

Our Data Protection Officer is Mrs Carmel Park.

The Personal Data We Hold

Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about pupils includes, but is not restricted to:

- Contact details, contact preferences, date of birth, identification documents
- Results of internal assessments and externally set tests
- Pupil and curricular records
- Characteristics, such as ethnic background, eligibility for free school meals, or special educational needs
- Exclusion information
- Details of any medical conditions, including physical and mental health
- Attendance information
- Safeguarding information
- Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support providers
- Photographs

Why We Collect and Use this Data

We collect and use pupil information, for the following purposes:

- To support pupil learning
- To monitor and report on pupil attainment progress
- To provide appropriate pastoral care
- Protect pupil welfare
- Assess the quality of our services
- Administer admissions waiting lists
- To keep children safe - food allergies, or emergency contact details
- To meet the statutory duties placed upon us for Dfe data collections
- Comply with the Law regarding data sharing

[Our Legal Basis for Using This Data](#)

We only collect and use pupils' personal data when the law allows us to. Most commonly, we process it where:

- We need to comply with a legal obligation
- We need it to perform an official task in the public interest

Less commonly, we may also process pupils' personal data in situations where:

- We have obtained consent to use it in a certain way
- We need to protect the individual's vital interests or someone else's interest

Where we have obtained consent to use pupils' personal data, this consent can be withdrawn at any time. We will make this clear when we ask for consent, and explain how consent can be withdrawn.

Some of the reasons listed above for collecting and using pupils' personal data overlap, and there may be several grounds which justify our use of this data.

[How We Collect Pupil Information](#)

While the majority of information we collect about pupils is mandatory, there is some information that can be provided voluntarily.

Whenever we seek to collect information from you or your child, we make it clear whether providing it is mandatory or optional. If it is mandatory, we will explain the possible consequences of not complying.

[How We Store This Data](#)

We keep personal information about pupils while they are attending our school. We may also keep it beyond their attendance at our school if this is necessary in order to comply with our legal obligations. [Information and Records Management Society's toolkit for schools](#) sets out how long we keep information about pupils.

[Who We Share Pupil Information With](#)

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the Law and our Policies allow us to do so. Where it is legally required or necessary and it complies with data protection law we may share personal information about pupils with

- Schools that the pupils attend after leaving us
- Our Local Authority
- The Department for Education (Dfe)
- Our Local Authority – to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and exclusions
- The Department for Education
- The pupil’s family and representatives
- Educators and examining bodies
- Our regulator - Ofsted
- Suppliers and service providers – to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Financial organisations
- Central and Local Government
- Our auditors
- Survey and research organisations
- Health Authorities
- Security Organisations
- Health and Social Welfare organisations
- Professional advisers and consultants
- Charities and voluntary organisations
- Police forces, Courts, Tribunals
- Professional Bodies

Department for Education

The Department for Education (DfE) collects personal data from educational settings and local authorities via various statutory data collections – eg Pupil Census. We are required to share information about our pupils with the Department for Education (DfE) either directly or via our Local Authority for the purpose of those data collections, under Section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

All data is transferred securely via Egress or S2S and held by the DfE under a combination of software and hardware controls, which meet the current [Government Security Policy Framework](#).

Parents and Pupils’ Rights Regarding Personal Data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child’s educational record, contact Carmel Park the Data Protection Officer.

You also have the right to:

- Object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- Prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- Object to decisions being taken by automated means

- In certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- A right to seek redress, either through the ICO, or through the courts

How Government Uses Your Data

The pupil data that we lawfully share with the DfE through data collections:

- Underpins school funding, which is calculated based upon the numbers of children and their characteristics in each school.
- Informs 'short term' education policy monitoring and school accountability and intervention (for example, school GCSE results or Pupil Progress measures).
- Supports 'longer term' research and monitoring of educational policy (for example how certain subject choices go on to affect education or earnings beyond school)

National Pupil Database

We are required to provide information about pupils to the Department for Education as part of statutory data collections such as the school census.

Some of this information is then stored in the [National Pupil Database](#) (NPD), which is owned and managed by the Department and provides evidence on school performance to inform research.

The database is held electronically so it can easily be turned into statistics. The information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and exam boards.

The Department for Education may share information from the NPD with other organisations which promote children's education or wellbeing in England. Such organisations must agree to strict terms and conditions about how they will use the data.

Sharing By The Department

The law allows the Department to share pupils' personal data with certain third parties, including:

- Schools
- Local Authorities
- Researchers
- Organisations connected with promoting the education or wellbeing of children in England
- Other Government Departments and Agencies
- Organisations fighting or identifying crime

Organisations fighting or identifying crime may use their legal powers to contact

DfE to request access to individual level information relevant to detecting that crime. Whilst numbers fluctuate slightly over time, DfE typically supplies data on around 600 pupils per year to the Home Office and roughly 1 per year to the Police.
